

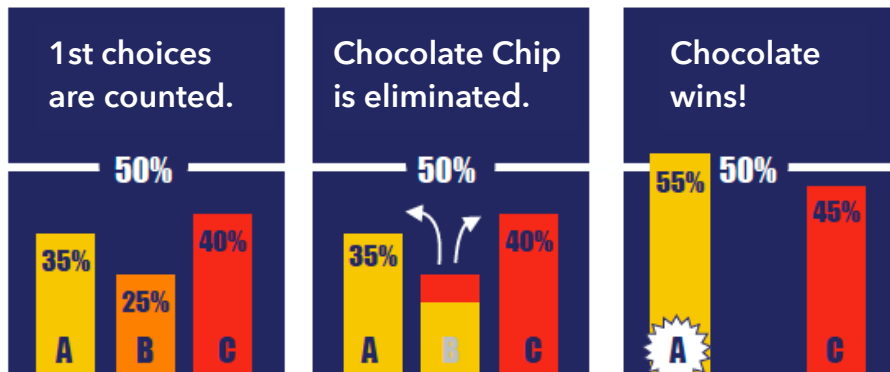
# Ranked Choice Voting

You have the freedom to rank candidates in order of choice. If your favorite candidate can't win, your vote is counted for your next choice, until someone wins a majority.

## Example Ballot

Ice Cream Ballot: Rank up to 3 candidates.		1st	2nd	3rd
<b>A</b>	Chocolate	<input type="radio"/>	<input checked="" type="radio"/>	<input type="radio"/>
<b>B</b>	Chocolate Chip	<input checked="" type="radio"/>	<input type="radio"/>	<input type="radio"/>
<b>C</b>	Peanut Butter	<input type="radio"/>	<input type="radio"/>	<input checked="" type="radio"/>

## Example Tally



No candidate has a majority. Chocolate Chip has the fewest 1st choices.

Those ballots are counted for the voter's 2nd choice.

The consensus is that Chocolate would be good.

# Ranked Choice Voting

## More Voice!



### Saves Money

Runoffs are avoided when voters have already indicated their second preference.



### Stronger Voices

Voters have a way to express preferences while still voting for their first choice.



### Broaden Participation

Candidates have to appeal to people who might initially vote for someone else.

Cities around the US have been using Ranked Choice Voting for years. They have seen:

- Improved turnout,
- More diverse candidates,
- More positive, issue-based campaigns.

Ranked Choice Voting means more Choice and more Voice!
